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Foreword

This Alexandria Archaeology publication is a transcription of the Alexandria Common Council Minutes for a specific period, 1817-1831. I asked Phil Erickson, a most thorough Alexandria Archaeology volunteer researcher, to undertake this task for a number of reasons. First, the original book of minutes sat safely in the City Clerk's Office; yet, the treasure house of knowledge was untapped. The pages could neither be handled well nor photocopied due to their fragile nature. In order to understand many basic aspects of the city's history, someone need to transcribe each page - a major task.

Second, when I asked Phil to undertake the transcription, I centered his work on the earliest surviving documents leading up to 1831. In that year, the Nat Turner Rebellion took place near Jerusalem, in Southampton County, Virginia. The Alexandria African American Neighborhood Project required a better understanding of how the City's leaders viewed the free Black population, and how they chose to respond to increasing conflict between Black and White.

While initially only signing on to transcribe this particular information, Phil quickly saw that the Minutes required complete transcription. Armed with a hand-held tape recorder, Phil spent over 100 hours in this job. He contributed many more hours editing this document.

The Word Center provided the much-needed technology to turn Phil's tapes into a useful written document. The final phases of the project were carried out by Dean Baird and Dr. Steven Shephard. They both edited the document to provide this final copy. Dean indexed the minutes for major topics of interest and locational information. However, due to the redundancy of individual names, a person index is not provided.

Today, microfilm copies of the Alexandria Council Minutes await researchers at the Lloyd House. Transcription and indexing of the post-1831 years will give us even more information. It is my hope that this report will stimulate interest in the Minutes as an archival source of political and governmental history, and also motivate others to further this transcription task.

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. . . Preface

Historians interested in archaeology try everything they know about, or might learn about, to discover new treasure troves. In this format, with a close working relationship with the Alexandria Archaeology staff and volunteers, a project came into being. Where were the Alexandria wells? Who owned them? Our quest led us to the <u>Minutes in Council</u> of the City of Alexandria, Virginia.

Quite fortunately we had access to the original records, the Genesis of another project. (see <u>Alexandria Water Company Per-</u><u>mits-the First 1000 Pipers</u>). Delving through these early records, it became apparent that much more was to be learned. The early wells, the City pumps, the tunnels to alleviate water damage, the tunnel gates the underground pipes, the wells -- even the flood gates in the lower regions of the City -- came to the fore.

And then came the question: Should we make a complete survey of those old records? What follows is a transcription of the <u>Minutes In Council</u>, 1817-1830. Reading the Minutes has been a study of the growth of Alexandria.

Some may comment on the spellings of names, the titles, the upper case and lower case of such, but I recorded these as they were reported in the Minutes. In this researching, some problems arose as a new scribe or recorder had to make the books. I am sure that any errors of some ten or fifteen decades ago might be excused. The records are veritable.

Through these recordings, it is sincerely hoped the history of the City will be enhanced and more especially, the clues and targets for the future Alexandria Archaeology "digs" may be enriched.

My great appreciation goes to Pat Walter and the Word Center staff for the production of this study. And also I want to thank Helen Holleman, Beverly Jett and all the people in the City Clerk's Office for providing me such courtesy and gracious working conditions.

Resolved, that 3 physicians be appointed by Ballot, one for each Division whose duty it shall be to visit every family within the District who are not in the habit of regularly calling in a

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physician in case of sickness, and innoculate the members of such families also standing in need thereof, with cow pock matter, and give them the necessary attention through the different stages of the disease: and when their duty is over that they report to Council the names of persons vacinated by each - resolved, that for the purpose of carrying into effect the proceeding resolutions, that the sum of \$150.00 be appropriated to pay each physician \$50.00 for his services from the contingent fund.

On balloting for Physician to carry into affect the foregoing resolution; Doctor Edmund Fitzhugh was appointed to the Northern District: Doctor John Richards, to the Middle District: and Doctor William Washington to the Southern District.

Ordered that the sum of \$113.33 be paid as the proportion in full of this Town of the expenses of a public dinner given by the Corporations of Alexandria, Washington and Georgetown, in November last. To be paid under the direction of the President of Council.

Ordered, that the sum of \$15 be paid to Mordecai Miller on account of the money of the Brig <u>Dove</u> in full of this claim for ballots furnished the Corporation.

Baden may continue to use the clay on Payne for the purpose of making bricks at the same price and under the same regulations as contained in a Act of Council 17th of June 1822, under subject; but this permission shall not extend for a longer time than the present year.

Messrs. Stewart, Mandeville, Mason and Miller were ordered to be a Committee on the subject of Henry Street.

A petition from the Butchers of the Town was received and read and referred to Messrs. Harris, Jamieson, Mason and Veitch.

On motion it is ordered that Messrs. Stewart, Mandeville, Mason and Veitch be a Committee to take into consideration the different proposals for preparing and lighting the public lamps and report thereon to Council together with any other matters relative to this Subject that shall appear to them proper to report upon.

The Committee appointed on the petition of John Rumney report in part, that an examination of the title under which the said Rumney Holds, the property mentioned in his petition, it appears that in 1808 the Common Council rented a water lot on the Northside of Duke Street to Leonard and Thomas Cooke for the term of 50 years at the annual rent of \$170.00 the lease containing a stipulation for the payment of taxes on the part of the lessees, the rent to be paid on the 20th February annually, that Leonard

and Thomas Cooke assigned their interest to Jackson and Rumney who afterward conveyed a part of said lot with a brick warehouse on it to Brown and Wilson freed from rent reserving the rent as charged exclusively on the lot, warehouse and Wharf now in the tenure of said Rumney - that on the 20th February 1825 more than 2 years rent was in arear amounting to \$390.00 and that another year's rent amounting with the above balance of \$560.00 was due on the 20th February last, that from Mr. Rumney's proposal the Council can scarcely expect to received the current rent, and have no prospect of securing the arrearages, that the Common Council is not bound by the contract between Jackson and Rumney and Wilson and Brown, and have therefore a right to look to both tenements as well for arrearages as for future rents - that an acceptance of the proposal of Mr. Rumney would preclude the Common Council from exercising the right of distress or reentering on the tenements and lot conveyed to Wilson and Brown and thus a practicable abandonment of their claim to rent on that property - Your Committee are of the opinion that it would therefore be unadvisable at this time to accede to the said proposal of John Rumney.

The Committee recommend that proper measures be taken to reenter on the whole premises devised to Leonard and Thomas Cooke when the rents shall next fall due and when the legal title shall be vested in the Common Council that the said John Rumney be allowed to apply for such equitable relief as the circumstances of his case may require.

The Committee are of the opinion that no mistake has been in the assessment of the taxes on the said tenement and lot held by the petitioner until the current year, and that the mistake then made was favorable to the petitioner inasmuch as the evaluation was reduce \$1,000.00 most probably from an ignorance on the part of the Assessors of this Convenant in the original lease for the payment of taxes.

The Committee ask further time to report on such part of the Said Petition as refers to the distressed heretofore levee.

Ordered that the tax on 1 dray improperly charged to John C. Vowell be remitted.

The Committee appointed to repair the Powder House, made a final report which was concurred in by the Council.

Ordered that the tax on 2S.STO. [second stories] improperly charged to Lawrence Hill be remitted.

Ordered that Messrs. Gardner, Taylor, Mandeville and Stewart be a Committee to consider and report to Council the best means of exercising the power vested in the Common Council of raising money for effecting importance improvements in and to the Town, which the ordinary funds and revenues thereof will not accomplish.

Ordered that the Auditor be allowed \$100.00 for extra services in preparing the accounts of the arrearages of taxes for paven [sic] and on real estate as order by Council July 6, 1826 to be paid to him when the amounts shall be posted.

Thompson, Mason and Hugh Smith be a Committee to obtain information regarding the intended survey of the contemplated public road from Fort Cumberland to Washington City: to use their endeavors to promote the entrance of Alexandria therein, and report thereon to Council.

Ordered that the Clerk of the Common Council do call upon the Collectors of the Public Revenue for their accounts of collections and payments during the current year, that he report such accounts regularly stated with a list of insolvents according to law, to the Common Council at their next meeting.

Resolve that Messrs. Phineas Janney, Edmund I. Lee, Thompson F. Mason, John A. Stewart and the President of Council be a Committee in conjunction with the Mayor to distribute the donations heretofore received, towards the immediate relief of the indigent suffers by the late fire, and to devise and report to the Council, a plan for appropriation and distribution of such future donations as may be received, in such manner as may be productive of the most effectual and extensive relief to the suffers by the said the fire.

The following report was received and adopted by the Council -

The Committee appointed to investigate the cause of the late fire; and the amount of the losses our fellow citizens have sustained, make the following report,

We have made a careful examination of the workmen in the employment of Mr. Green in whose shop the fire originated, and have unable to ascribe it to any marked neglect on their part. It appears from the best evidence we can obtain, that those have been consumed 53 buildings consisting of dwelling, ware and store houses, exclusive of a number of stables and other out buildings not enumerated: All which are value at \$60,920.00; and personal property which we have estimated at \$46,357.00, making the aggregate sum of \$107,277.00 - the fatal affects of this calamity presses particularly hard on a number of the sufferers, who have lost their all, and are compelled at this inclement season to seek shelter where charity may afford them a place to reside, until they can be more permanently provided for. It may be proper for us further to state, that the amount of personal property is in the nature vague and indefinite, the sufferers being at this early period, unable to determine the precise amount of their loss.

We have not been governed exclusively in the estimation of the loss of personal property, by the statements of the parties - we herewith transmit the evidence of James Green and his apprentices. We have not been able to discover any other who could give information as to the cause of the fire.

The Committee appointed by Council on the 20th of January in conjunction with the Mayor, to distribute the donations then received, towards the immediate relief of the indigent suffers by the fire of the 18th and to report to Council and plan for the appropriation, and distribution of such future donations as might be received, - REPORT. that they have, in conjunction with the Mayor, proceeded agreeably to the first part of the Order of their appointment to distribute funds amongst those that they believe the most needy to relieve their immediate wants. And that they have with great assiduity and attention to the important object of their appointment, collected and examined the statements and exhibits of the individual sufferers, and estimate the amount of lost of personal property of each individual claimant according to the best evidence that they have been able to procure, and are unanimously of opinion, that it will be impossible to lay down any general plan or rule for distributing the donations amongst the sufferers, other than for it to be done under the direction, and at the discretion of a discrete committee to be appointed by the Common Council to act in conjunction with the Mayor, which is pointed out in the Law of Congress making the munificent appropriation of \$20,000 for the relief of the indigent sufferers by the fire in Alexandria of the 18th of January, an Act which exhibits in the most satisfactory manner, the fostering care and protection of the Government to those placed under their exclusive jurisdiction and as such in the opinion of your Committee, entitle the Congress of the United States to the warmest thanks of the Common Council of Alexandria, and the citizens thereof your Committee further report, that they have paid attention to the claim for loss of houses burnt, but as all of those claims have not yet been handed in, it was thought best not to defer their report, particularly as those claims can be handed in to such Committee as Council may appoint for completing the work, as to the present Committee.

Signed by order of the Committee: Phineas Janney, Chairman, Alexandria, February 3, 1827.

And it is thereupon Resolved that the same Committee in conjunction with Mayor, be requested to proceed to make an apportionment at their discretion, of such funds as have been or may be received for the indigent sufferers by the late fire, keeping in view the intention of the donors, and that such apportionment, when completed, be reported to Council for their consideration.

The Committee for distributing funds for the relief for the indigent sufferers by the fire of the 18th January communicated to Council an application made to them in behalf of Joseph Grant a Blacksmith, residing in Washington dependent on his labor for the support of his family and now confined to his bed, and has been so every since the time of the fire here, when he volunteered his services, and came to our assistance, by which means he received a serious injury from a fall into a cellar clearing himself from the folding brick wall of a house where he was stationed at work, to assist in extinguishing the fire. The injury received by his fall is believed to be the cause of his present illness, by which his family is deprived of their support and with him now suffering for want of the common necessaries of life.

The Committee being of opinion this was case that called for the interference of the Common Council, have reported it with the document accompanying the application - whereupon, it is ordered that \$100.00 be in the same is hereby appropriated for the relief of Joseph Grant to be paid out of any monies in the Treasury and charged to the General Fund, and that the sum be transmitted to C. W. Goldsborough, Esquire, to be applied by him for the benefit of the said Joseph Grant.

The Committee to whom was referred the Communication of the Mayor under the date of 9th of October 1826, made a report accompanied by the following bills, <u>viz</u>.;

"An Act to provide for the removal of all paupers, vagrants, and such other persons as may not be legally entitled to residence within the limits of the Corporation of Alexandria."

"An Act respecting Apprentices, slaves and free people of color." Which was severally read a first time and laid on the table.

Ordered that Messrs. Veitch, Jamieson, Gardner and Johnston in conjunction with the President of Council and the Superintendent of Police be appointed a Committee to rent the Fish Wharf on the first day of March, and that the Superintendent of Police do advertise forthwith that he will proceed on that day to lay out and rent the stands thereon according to law, and that the said Committee do take bonds or notes with good security for the payment of the rents contracted for.

A petition having been presented by Mary D. Washington asking that certain taxes should be refunded to her which she alleges have been improperly charged on the real estate of Lawerence A. Washington and paid by her since the Year 1822 - ordered that the Auditor be directed to examine the lists of taxes as charged to said Lawerence A. Washington or his representatives since the year 1822, and to ascertain whether any and what amount of taxes have been so improperly charged - and further that he ascertain and report to Council to what other persons, and to what amount said taxes ought to have been regularly charged.

Ordered that the tax on 1 tythe and 1STO [story] improperly paid by Frances Hoye, be refunded.

Ordered that Messrs. Jamieson, White and Anderson be a Committee to examined that lower end of Princess Street, and the situation of the Wharf at the foot of the same, and report to Council what repairs are necessary to the same. Andrew Scholfield was appointed a Commissioner of election in the Third Ward, in the place of A. C. Cazenove resigned.

Resolved unanimously that the thanks of the Common Council be presented to Robert I. Taylor, Esquire, for his faithful and impartial discharge of his duties as President during the past year.
