This Alexandria Archaeology publication is a transcription of the Alexandria Common Council Minutes for a specific period, 1817-1831. I asked Phil Erickson, a most thorough Alexandria Archaeology volunteer researcher, to undertake this task for a number of reasons. First, the original book of minutes sat safely in the City Clerk's Office; yet, the treasure house of knowledge was untapped. The pages could neither be handled well nor photocopied due to their fragile nature. In order to understand many basic aspects of the city's history, someone need to transcribe each page - a major task.

Second, when I asked Phil to undertake the transcription, I centered his work on the earliest surviving documents leading up to 1831. In that year, the Nat Turner Rebellion took place near Jerusalem, in Southampton County, Virginia. The Alexandria African American Neighborhood Project required a better understanding of how the City's leaders viewed the free Black population, and how they chose to respond to increasing conflict between Black and White.

While initially only signing on to transcribe this particular information, Phil quickly saw that the Minutes required complete transcription. Armed with a hand-held tape recorder, Phil spent over 100 hours in this job. He contributed many more hours editing this document.

The Word Center provided the much-needed technology to turn Phil's tapes into a useful written document. The final phases of the project were carried out by Dean Baird and Dr. Steven Shephard. They both edited the document to provide this final copy. Dean indexed the minutes for major topics of interest and locational information. However, due to the redundancy of individual names, a person index is not provided.

Today, microfilm copies of the Alexandria Council Minutes await researchers at the Lloyd House. Transcription and indexing of the post-1831 years will give us even more information. It is my hope that this report will stimulate interest in the Minutes as an archival source of political and governmental history, and also motivate others to further this transcription task.

Foreword

Preface

Historians interested in archaeology try everything they know about, or might learn about, to discover new treasure troves. In this format, with a close working relationship with the Alexandria Archaeology staff and volunteers, a project came into being. Where were the Alexandria wells? Who owned them? Our quest led us to the <u>Minutes in Council</u> of the City of Alexandria, Virginia.

Quite fortunately we had access to the original records, the Genesis of another project. (see <u>Alexandria Water Company Per-</u><u>mits-the First 1000 Pipers</u>). Delving through these early records, it became apparent that much more was to be learned. The early wells, the City pumps, the tunnels to alleviate water damage, the tunnel gates the underground pipes, the wells -- even the flood gates in the lower regions of the City -- came to the fore.

And then came the question: Should we make a complete survey of those old records? What follows is a transcription of the <u>Minutes In Council</u>, 1817-1830. Reading the Minutes has been a study of the growth of Alexandria.

Some may comment on the spellings of names, the titles, the upper case and lower case of such, but I recorded these as they were reported in the Minutes. In this researching, some problems arose as a new scribe or recorder had to make the books. I am sure that any errors of some ten or fifteen decades ago might be excused. The records are veritable.

Through these recordings, it is sincerely hoped the history of the City will be enhanced and more especially, the clues and targets for the future Alexandria Archaeology "digs" may be enriched.

My great appreciation goes to Pat Walter and the Word Center staff for the production of this study. And also I want to thank Helen Holleman, Beverly Jett and all the people in the City Clerk's Office for providing me such courtesy and gracious working conditions.

On balloting for a messenger, James Campbell was unanimously reelected.

Ordered that Mssrs. Morgan, Davis, Deneale, and Vowell be a committee to bring in bills fixing the salaries of the officers of the Corporation, and for raising a revenue for the present year -

Ordered that Mssrs. Janney, T. Vowell, Anderson and Hipkins be a committee to examine into the situation of the Lancastrian Schools and report to this Council on the subject, and how far the provisions enter into in regard to the education of children of the corporation, have been carried into effect -

Edmund I. Lee, Esquire the Mayor-Elect, appeared and had the oath of office administered to him by Thomas Vowell, Esquire, Justice of the Peace in the presence of the Council -

Ordered that Mssrs. Janney, Newton, Swann, and Vowell be a Committee to superintend the finishing of the new Market House -

Ordered that Mssrs. Veitch, Newton, Rhodes, and Hipkins be a Committee to inquire into the situation of the streets, and public property of the Town and report to Council what repairs and improvements may be necessary to that.

The Council then adjourned Hugh Smith, President

Ordered that the Committee appointed to Superintend the furnishing of the New Market House due cause the carpenters work already done to be remeasured before commencing the new work of the present year -

Ordered that Mssrs. C. Vowell and Morgan be a committee to form an estimate of the probable expenses of the Corporation for the present year, and to report a bill making the necessary appropriations -

Ordered that the tax on 1 tyth improperly charged to William DeVaughan be refunded -

Ordered that the proprietors of the ground on the north of Cameron between Pitt and Royal Streets; on the west of Cameron between Pitt and St. Asaph Streets; and on Pitt on east and west between Cameron and Queen Streets do cause to be removed the nuisance on the same by filling up the sunken ground on or before the first day of May next, and that the Superintendent of Police do give them notice that if the said nuisance be not removed at the time aforesaid, that he will, and he is hereby directed to proceed according to law.

Ordered that the Clerk prepare and lay before the Council at their next meeting, and account of the rents due from the tenants of the public property for the year 1812, 13, 14, 15, and 16, and the sums expected on the said property, redesignating the same specially -

The Act fixing the salaries of the officers of the corporation for the present year was returned by the Mayor with his objections to the law in writing - the Common Council thereupon proceeded to reconsider the same by section; and upon the question to adhere to the section describing the salary of the Mayor, the Ayes and the Noes were as follows.

Ayes: Mssrs. Janney, Swann, Gird, Morgan, Newton, Anderson, Longeden,

Noes: Mssrs. C. Vowell, Taylor, Deneale, Veitch, Rhodes, Vowell, Smith.

On reconsidering the section prescribing the compensation of the printers the sum of \$50 was stricken out and \$75 inserted in its place; the bill was then upon motion ordered to be on the table -

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police due cause a tunnel to be placed across the north end of Fairfax Street near Montgomery Street so as to carry off the stagnant water, and cause the top of the same to be filled in with earth or gravel provided the expense of the same does not exceed \$50, to be charged to the Second Ward -

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police due forthwith cause West Street north of King to be regulated so as to admit the passage of carriages and charge the expense to the Third Ward,

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police due cause so much of Water Street as fronts a lot leased to Beard and Tyler, between Queen and Cameron Streets to be filled up so as to admit of a passage to their workshop, and charge the expense to the Second Ward, provided it does not exceed \$25 -

Ordered that the Committee appointed to Superintend the finishing of the new Market House, be and they are hereby authorize to rent the "Marine", and "Fire" insurance companies two rooms, not exceeding 24 feet each in the same house adjoining the rooms already rented for the use of the Exchange Coffee House, at the rent of \$100 each per annum, and that they do cause the same to be finished as soon as possible agreeably with law -

Whereas, it appears to the Common Council that the presentation of the navigation of the river, and the prevention of imports thereto and to the docks is of primary importance to the present and further interest of the town, and that it would be a great benefit to designate a line conformable as far as practicable to the course of the channel, beyond which no person should be allowed to extend their improvements is therefore ordered, that Mssrs. Gird, Janney, and Morgan be a committee to obtain information on the subject, to inquire into the expediency of procuring a machine for cleansing the docks, and to report to Council such plans, as to them may seem best adapted to effect the subject in view -

On balloting for the Assessors for the present year John T. Brock, and William Ramsay were duly attested.

The Act establishing the Fish Market at the county wharf was read, a "second" time and "third" time and passed.

Ordered that the publication of the resolution of the 1st of March last relative to William W. Fitzhugh and of this order be suspended--.

Ordered that the petition of sundry grocers of town of Alexandria requesting a tax be levied on retailers of goods from vessels at the wharf be referred to Messrs. Gird and Longden who are authorized to report by bill or otherwise -.

The Committee to inquire into the conduct of the late high constable made a report which was read -- Ordered that Mssrs. Gird and Rhodes be a committee who with the Superintendent of Police after due notice of the same being given in the newspapers of the Town of the time and place, shall proceed to lease to the highest bidder the lot on the public fish wharf for the benefit of the Corporation until the 1st day of June next, and make such disposition of the public warehouse as they may think proper.

On the petition of sundry proprietors of lots on both sides of Duke Street between St. Asaph and Columbus Streets, it is ordered that the Superintendent of Police do proceed to pave Duke Street from the west side of St. Asaph Street to the west side of Columbus Street, according to law as soon as possible--.

On the petition on sundry proprietors of lots on both sides of Columbus Street between Prince and Duke Streets it is ordered that the Superintendent of Police do proceed to pave Columbus Street between Prince and Duke Streets according to law as soon as practicable -

On the petition of sundry proprietors of lots on both sides of Washington Street between Prince and Duke Streets it is ordered that the Superintendent of Police do proceed to pave Washington Street between Prince and Duke Streets according to law as soon as practicable.

Resolved that it be considered a part of the duty of Police Constables to pass occasionally through the Market Square and to disperse the coloured and other vagrants collected there for the purpose of a rioting and gambling after the hour of 10:00 in each day.

Ordered that Mssrs. Morgan, Veitch and Vowell be appointed a Committee to ascertain the probable cause of a "Town Clock" and make a report to Council.

The Council resumed the consideration of the act for raising a revenue for the year 1817, which having been read a "second" time, amended, and the blanks being filled, it was then read a "third" time and passed.

The Act making appropriations for the year 1817, was read a "second" time, and the blanks being filled, it was then read a "third" time and passed.

Ordered that Mssrs. Davis and Veitch be a Committee who, with the Superintendent of Police be authorized to examine the state of the dock at the lower end of Prince Street, and report a mode for the cleansing thereof.

Ordered that the Clerk do furnish the Superintendent of Police with a copy of the laws and all orders passed during the present Council directing certain duties to be performed by him.

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police do proceed to regulate Wolfe Street between Prince and St. Asaph Streets at the expense of the "Fourth" Ward and to set the side stones on the south side of Wolfe Street between St. Asaph and Pitt Streets at the expense of the proprietors according to law.

Ordered that the Board of Regulators, together with the Superintendent of Police do report to Council forthwith what will be the proper regulation of Oronoco Street between Fairfax and Union Streets as a permanent regulation.

Ordered that Mssrs. Deneale, Swann and Hipkins be a Committee to report the best and most practicable mode of draining water from Henry Street between Cameron and King Streets and if they shall be of opinion that the least expense will be in making a cut from Henry along Cameron Street west or repairing the present tunnel that the Superintendent be instructed to commence the work under such instruction as they shall give him for that purpose, and charge the expense to the "Third Ward" -

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police do cause the gutters on both sides of Union Street between King and Prince to be repaired.

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police be and he is hereby directed to report to Council the best mode of removing the nuisance of the sunken ground on the north side of Oronoco between Fairfax and Union Streets -

Ordered that in future the Superintendent of Police do cause large flat stones of sufficient width for a foot way to be laid at all of the intersections of streets hereafter paved. On the petition of sundry proprietors of ground of both sides of Queen Street, it is ordered that the Superintendent of Police do proceed to pave Queen Street between Royal and Fairfax Streets according to law -

Ordered that the application of James Young relative to his taxes in the year 1815 be referred to Mssrs. Anderson and Longden -

Ordered that the Superintendent do give notice to the proprietor or proprietors of the sunken ground south of King Street between Henry and Fayette Streets to fill up the same and provided it is not done in ten (10) days that he shall proceed to fill up the same, and charge the expense to the proprietors.

"An act entitled - An Act to repeal an Act to authorize the payment of the salary of the Superintendent of Pumps" was upon motion indefinitely postponed -

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police do cause the foot ways on Water between Wilkes and Wolfe, and on Wilkes between Water and Fairfax be regulated and charge expense to the "First Ward."

The report of the Committee on the petition of James Young was adopted by the Council, whereupon ordered that the sum of \$10.88 be paid under a judgment of the Mayor for retailing liquors, without a license in the year 1813 be suspended, and that a fine and cost imposed on a second judgment for similar offense be remitted -

On balloting for a Surveyor and Regulator John T. Brooks was appointed the Surveyor and William Yeaton, and Thomas Reston appointed Regulators -

Mr. Deneale from the Committee appointed on that part of the Mayor's communication relative to auctioneers reported "An act to amend an act for licensing auctioneers and other purposes", which was read a "first" time and laid on the table. Mr. Morgan from the Committee appointed on that part of the Mayor's communication relative to the inspection of fish reported "An Act to amend an act entitled An Act for the inspection of pork, beef, and fish in the Town of Alexandria" which was read a "first" time and laid on the table.

Resolved that the Superintendent of Police do cause the gutters on the west side of Royal between King and Prince Streets to be repaired and charge the expense to the "first" and "second" wards. Resolved that Mssrs. Deneale and Veitch be a Committee to take into consideration the propriety of amending the laws concerning the paving of alleys.

Resolved that so much of the pavement on Union Street between Prince and King be taken up and regulated as to give the water a free passage through the gutters on each side of said street, and that the expense be a portion between the "First" and "Second" Wards -

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police and the Committee of the Ward do dispose of the earth for the purpose of making bricks or otherwise, that is now above the level in Fayette and Payne Street between Duke and Prince Streets, and that he do dispose of the same at public auction, the proceeds to be placed in the credit of the "Fourth Ward" -

Ordered that the Clerk of the Market do cause the outside walks of the lower Market next to the scale house be kept for the use of the country people only.

Mr. Deneale from the Committee reported "An Act to amend an Act entitled An act concerning the paving of alleys and other purposes," which was read a "first" time and laid on the table -

Ordered that Mssrs. Longden and Gird be appointed a Committee in conjunction with the Clerk of the Market to rent out the stalls in the Market House, and make report to Council on the subject.

Resolve that Mssrs. Lee and Vowell be a committee to inquire whether any, and what amendments are necessary in the act concerning the chalybeate or medical spring.

The Common Council after considering the said agreement do hereby satisfy that the said committee have done, and under that the President of the Common Council, and the Mayor do sign and execute in due form of law the said agreement -- and also that they had rented the small room to the south of the one rented to the levy court to Edmond I. Lee at the rent of \$75 for one year from the time he takes possession of the same, with the privilege of holding the said room at the same rent for four years longer. Which latter agreement is also confirmed by the Common Council.

The petition of Thomas Brocchus and others on the subject of Pitt Street was read and referred to Mssrs. Adam and McGuire.

The petition of Joseph Borseau was read and referred to Mrs. Hipkins.

Ordered that the fine imposed upon Samuel Howard for permitting his dog to follow to the market place, be remitted, it appearing to the Common Council that he is unable to pay the same. Ordered unanimously that the certificates of William Wedderburn and Bryan Hampson respecting the deportment and language of George Coryell, Superintendent of Police, while in the discharge of his official duties toward Mordecai Miller, be referred to Mssrs. Hooe and Lee, with the power to inquire into the conduct of the said George Coryell as to his manner in discharging the duties of his office, and to take testimony and report to the Common Council as soon as practicable.

The committee to whom was referred the memorial of Joseph Boiseau made a report recommending the suspension of the collection of taxes due from him until further ordered the Council, which was adopted.

Ordered unanimously that the Street Commissioners do cause Pitt from Cameron to Queen Street to be paved according to law.

Ordered that the Street Commissioners do reset the curbstones on the southside of Cameron Street, from Washington to St. Asaph Street, and also those on the east side of Washington from Cameron to King Street, and to pave the gutters concave. The expense to be charged to the "Third Ward."

The Council then adjourned until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Ordered that Mssrs. Lee, Smith and Janney be a Committee to inquire into the laws relating to poor orphan children, and if practicable, to devise an effectual system for the institution of such, in some useful art.

Ordered that the Mayor do cause to be laid before the Council a report of the Inspectors of the House of Industry, stating the progress they have made, how many of the poor have been relieved, and the expense of the house.

- 1. That the Mayor and the President of the Common Council together with Mssrs. Thomas Swann, Robert I. Taylor and Edmund I. Lee be requested to proceed to Washington at the time appointed by the committee, and at such times thereafter as may be deemed necessary, for the purpose of holding a conference with the said Committee of Congress upon the subject suggested by the President in the said message.
- 2. That the said Deputies be instructed, and they are hereby instructed to represent to the Committee of Congress, as the sense of the the Common Council of Alexandria, that the establishment of a local government for the District of Columbia, under any modification whatever, would, in their opinion, neither comport with the interests or inclinations of the people of Alexandria.
- 3. That the Deputies do further represent, as the sense of this Council, that they're aware of no means by which the direct control of Congress could safely be dispensed in relation to this portion of the District, unless by such a modification of our Charter, as would give the municipal authorities of the town the power of enacting their own laws to an extent commensurate with the reasonable wants of the community."

On balloting for Inspectors of the House of Industry, the following gentlemen were duly elected, <u>viz</u>., Charles Page, John Harper, Bernard Bryan, Guy Atkinson, Anthony Crease, Isaac Robbins, Mordecai Miller, and Jonathan Janney.

Mr. Morgan from the committee appointed to inquire into the cause of the erection of the portico in front of the Fish Market, reported, that they investigated the circumstances of the case and were satisfied with the conduct of the officers appointed to superintend the same; which report was concurred and by the Council.

Ordered that Mssrs. Gird and Vowell be a committee to receive and distribute the donation of the late Ont McGrath.

The citizens of Alexandria impressed with a sense of the heavy and intensive calamity which has befallen the City of Savannah, have instructed me to transmit by the ship <u>Fairtrader</u>, George Fletcher, Master, 200 barrels of superfine flour for the relief of the suffers, and to express their sincere sorrow for an event productive of so much immediate distress, and probable to arrest in so great a degree the prosperity of an industrious and enterprising community.

While they lament the general misfortune they sympathize specifically with the indigent classes of the population, who at an inclement season and embarassing times have been deprived of shelter and subsistence - under this feeling they have ordered the amount of the subscription in a shape which may administer to them the most and necessary relief. I take pleasure in adding that the owners of the ship <u>Fairtrader</u>, of whom Captain Fletcher is one/having contributed in common with their fellow Townsmen, have lent further aid by undertaking to convey one-fourth of the flour freight free.

The Committee appointed to bring in a Bill amending the law on the subject of paving streets and reported a Bill entitled "An Act amending an Act entitled an Act reducing into one and amending several Acts respecting streets, alley, pavements, pumps, and the Superintendent of Police" which was read a first and second time and laid on the table.

Ordered that the Order passed on the 16 day of April 1822 ordering the square on Pitt Street between Princess and Queen Streets to be paved, be and the same as hereby repealed. The Committee appointed to examined the Corporation dock at the lower end of Princess Street reported that it was inexpedient at present to do anything to the said dock which was concurred in by the Council.

The Committee appointed to inquire into the situation of the list of balances contained in the book of the late William A. Harper made a report and offered the following resolutions, resolved, that a fit and suitable person be appointed a Collector to be denominated the Collector of old balances, and that the Book which contains that list, also the amount of taxes uncollected by John M. Phillips be placed in the hands of the said Collector for collection, and that he proceed to collect the same according to law, and that he give bond with one or more securities to the satisfaction of the Mayor for the faithful performance of the said duties.

Resolved that the said Collector of old balances be allowed to as full compensation for his services 10 percent on all monies collected by him and paid into the Treasury of the Corporation and more over he shall on or before the 1st day of March in each year, render a statement to the Auditors of the whole amount of monies by him collected - which report and resolutions were adopted by the Council.

Ordered that a suitable person be appointed to make out a list of balances in the book posted by William A. Harper and owing to the Corporation and that \$20.00 be appropriated for the same.

Ordered that Messrs. Douglass and Johnston be Committee to inquire into the propriety of ordering away the watermelon boats from Prince Street dock, and into the Law respecting landing and cleaning of fish, and that they report by Bill or otherwise.

Mr. Douglass from the above Committee reported a Bill entitled, "an Act in addition to and amending an Act: 'An Act reducing into one and amending the several Acts respecting the removal of nuisances and the preservation of the health of the Town'" which was read a first and second time and ninth rule being suspended, it was then read a third time and passed.

A Communication from the Board of Health on the Subject of a nuisance said to exist at the lower end of King Street was received and read and referred to Messrs. Douglass, Miller, Longden, and Robinson.

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police do give notice to the proprietors of the marsh leading from the Chalybeate Spring to the tunnel on Fairfax Street to remove the nuisance thereon, on or before the 10th June, otherwise to proceed to remove the same, the expense to be paid by the General Fund, and collected from the proprietors. On the application of 2/3 of the proprietors of ground on Cameron between Alfred and Patrick Streets, it is ordered that the Superintendent of Police have the Square paved on Cameron Street lying between Patrick and Alfred Streets and charge the expense thereof to the proprietors of ground thereupon agreeable to law.

Ordered that the Superintendent of Police do immediately fill-up the hole and repair Water Street between Oronoco and Princess Streets injured by taking away the sand provided, the expense does not exceed \$5.00, and that he desist from taking away more sand at the said street.
