took position, by my guardian's advice, in the French Diplomatic corps. A few months there sufficed to rid me of my boyish error, that to win success, it needs only to deserve it. A .WONDERFUL

A WONDERFUL HARRATIVE OF OLD ALEXANDRIA, OR THE CONFESSION OF JOHN TRUST.

CHAPTER 6.
