This project is for engineering design and permit inquiries for an ADA-accessible water access point, a necessary first step toward having a 'shovel-ready' project that would increase our ability to leverage grant funding and corporate donations to fund construction. A water access point at Commonwealth Avenue would provide City residents an outstanding opportunity for healthy recreation in nearby nature, in addition to supporting kayak-based stream clean-ups, our most popular and in-demand stewardship activity.

A water access point is consistent with City plans:

The Four Mile Run Restoration Master Plan and the Four Mile Run Park Improvement Plan has involved various stakeholders over the past 15 years during which water access was repeatedly discussed. As part of the design process, we intend to conduct outreach and convene a community meeting to explore desired design features and to engage potential donors for construction funding. In particular, we would seek input from the nearby neighborhood and business associations on both sides of the Run. Many of the participants in our kayak-based clean-ups have voiced support for a proper dock facility, and staff at Cora Kelly School have expressed interest in it as a water quality teaching resource. A key feature of the project is design for accessibility: an ADA-compliant ramp, dock, and boat launch system will not only ensure accessibility for those with mobility impairments but also provide for safe entry and landing for novice paddlers.

In late 2017 we contacted RK&K Engineering to assess project feasibility and to estimate the engineering design cost. RK&K is the firm that handled the tidal wetland restoration, so they already have depth data for the tidal channel and current contacts for permitting in the flood control channel, and they provided the assessment on a pro bono basis. RK&K provided us preliminary drawings that demonstrate the project is feasible. Completion of the water access point would require the approval of the City and of the US Army Corps of Engineers, and the design and permitting would need to be developed in tandem. Completion of this design project will ensure that the dock is ready either for construction as a capital improvement project or as a public/private partnership project. If the latter, the Four Mile Run Conservatory Foundation would anticipate conducting additional fundraising and pursuing grant opportunities to support dock construction.

The City of Alexandria is handing over the management of the Holmes Run Community Garden to the gardeners beginning in 2020. To ensure a smooth transition and stability in garden rentals, the garden leadership seeks to address specific needs and deficiencies at Holmes Run that exist there. These include: mulch and compost bins, fencing, landscaping, and storage. Receiving this grant would allow the garden to construct these structures, thereby creating an attractive garden, stable plot renters, and fiscal stability. With these element the garden can thrive and contribute to the surrounding community.

The current makeup of garden renters includes seniors, young professionals, married couples, parents with children, veterans, and civil service employees. The garden is within 1/8 mile of three apartment and condo complexes. Growing the connection with the garden and these communities is only possible with a healthy, vibrant and stable garden.

Holmes run currently has 40 plots and will add 4 more this season. These 44 gardeners are required to paying rent, meeting the mandatory of volunteer hours, and gardening according the rules and regulations established by the city. Therefore, if selected, these 44 gardeners would commit an additional 100 hour of labor, \$500 in funds, and seek and additional \$1500 from outside sources such as non-profits, for profit businesses (Home Depot and garden centers).

If selected and if the goals of objectives are properly and fully implemented, beginning in the 2021 garden season, the City would see and be able to measure the following: a fully rented garden, 60% renewal rate, the construction of mulch and compost bins, the construction of uniform fencing, and two community engagement events.

To Whom It May Concern:

Thank you for considering the grant application submitted on behalf of the Holmes Run Community Garden by Neil Snyder. The Holmes Run Community Garden is a small, 24 plot garden on Holmes Run Parkway in the west end of the city of Alexandria.

Approximately two years ago we entered a PARKnership with the city of Alexandria to take on additional responsibilities for the maintenance of the community gardens and surrounding areas. At this time we are moving towards self governance with additional responsibilities being passed to the garden and gardeners. Since entering this agreement with the city we have seen an increase in the sense of community the gardens are meant to provide and an increase in the beautification of the gardens and surrounding areas. This grant would allow us to continue building this sense of community and beautifying the gardens.

In the past several years the community gardens have transformed from a “shanty town” of unsafe structures and no community to a maintained set of structures and a much stronger community. We hold several social events throughout the season and host a number of garden workdays where we work on the exterior of the garden. At our social events and our workdays we have people from the surrounding community join us to help with the beautification of the area or just enjoy the social interaction with the gardeners in the community.

While we have seen mostly positive interactions with the surrounding community, gardeners have been increasingly plagued by damage to their gardens and stolen produce, flowers, and plants as well as illegal dumping of dirt, landscaping materials, and general trash (a toilet was dumped in the garden this spring). With this grant we plan to install a single perimeter fence and bins for wood chips and mulch. This will continue the beautification of the gardens and hopefully deter dumping near the gardens since the materials such as wood chips will be contained and not just sitting in a large pile by the garden.

We will also use the opportunity of a fenced in garden to start a dedicated area where gardeners can grow produce to donate to those in need in the city of Alexandria. We are also trying to start “seminars” hosted by the gardeners out in the park on topics such as how to grow gardens, plant identification, preserving fresh vegetables, and uses for your crops. These will be open not only to the gardeners but the community as a whole.

The Holmes Run Community Garden gardeners commit to matching the funds as required by the grant, provide substantial sweat equity, and work to find additional ways to involve the surrounding community in the gardens and continue to build a community at the gardens.

The Ewald Parkour Park Project was conceived back in December 2017 and approved by the City Parks and Recreation Committee in November 2018. The Park Project aims to activate a space that has been neglected for almost a 2 decades since the two tennis courts were removed from the space back in the early 2000s. The park would serve as a multi-generational play-space, with the equipment being designed so that both youth and adults alike can participate. Additionally, the equipment such as wooden beams and metal bars allow for an extensive variety of movements and more overall usage out of the space. Finally, we hope that this park will jump-start a flow of restoration and revitalization projects to Ewald and bring this centralized Alexandria park to its full potential.

The Park would offer a space for members of the Wakefield-Tarleton neighborhood (children, teens, and adults alike) to meet and play. It would serve as an area for community building through the cohesive and all-accepting nature of parkour and movement sports in general. Additionally, it would provide the sedentary youth of the area with more opportunities for physical activity, specifically for those who haven't found a sport that they enjoy yet. The Park also has the potential to bring in residents from all over Alexandria, increasing circulation of peoples near the park and supporting local businesses. In addition, back in November of 2018, an open house was held introducing the park plan to the residents of the Wakefield-Tarleton neighborhood and the disciple of parkour. The event received very positive feedback and some of the comments from those who came can be seen here:

An ACT for Alexandria "Field of Interest Fund" account has been set up as the mechanism to store funds from potential donors. This account allows all contributions to be tax deductible. Once at least \$10,000 dollars are raised in the account, payments toward the project may be made. Since the project has been approved and the City has already allocated funds for the removal of the old, abandoned pool and pool house at Ewald, these next months will be consumed with fundraising and asking for contributions from local corporation branches and Alexandria citizens. Once the goal has been reached and the project has been finalized, construction can begin. Construction will be handled by professional, city-approved contractors due to the complexity of the build. Additionally, the pool house must be removed first in order to stay in accordance with Stormwater regulations. The pool house is planning to be demolished in the summer of 2019, which works out as that is around the time we are hoping to have acquired most if not all of the necessary funds.

After the \$80,000 goal is met and the park is constructed, I will consider it a success if it increases usage of Ewald Park by Alexandria citizens and the Wakefield-Tarleton neighborhood. Additionally, the park will hopefully serve as the catalyst for change at Ewald and will jumpstart the rest of the proposed improvements to the space such as the movement of the playground down to the lower lot (nearer to the street, increasing visibility and safety), construction of an adult calisthenics/exercise area, and walking path that encircles the lot. Moreover, the park will bring more attention to Ewald's condition and hopefully create a safer environment for park-goers.

Whitaker (age 3) from Alexandria has a selfless wish: to renovate her city's playground to make it extra special for herself and her neighborhood friends. Whitaker absolutely loves going to the Woodbine tot lot; it is by far her favorite place! She spends time there every day—or asking her parents when she can go back and play.

We are partnering with the DRPCA to renovate the pocket park, ahead of the City's currently-scheduled renovation date. Whitaker's wish aligns with the RPCA Strategic Plan as she wants to create a space where her community—friends, family and neighbors who have supported her and her family throughout her treatment—can have a place to CONNECT and share MEANINGFUL EXPERIENCES together.

Over 80% of Wish parents and health care professionals surveyed observe an increased willingness by their Wish kids to comply with treatment and believe that the Wish experience can influence their physical and emotional health. Wishes also transform the volunteers and communities who help grant the Wish. Our mission and demonstrated outcomes correlate directly to the RPCA's strategic goals to "improve well-being" through nature, connections, partnerships—and Wishes.

Because she is a very frequent visitor to the tot lot, it is no surprise that Whitaker's wish list closely mirrors the community feedback previously ascertained by RPCA:

- A "bike path" around the perimeter, so the toddlers have a safe place to ride tricycles, little cars, and learn to bike, as well as connect elements within the space
- A "climbing wall" type structure
- A larger fire truck play structure
- Additional swings for bigger kids, and
- A new picnic table and additional seating for rest and snacking.

Once we have a design in-hand, we propose holding a celebration at the park where our staff and the designers officially present Whitaker with the plans for her--and the community's input. Having Whitaker and her friends and neighbors participate in the design process is a magical and essential element of the Wish process--it gives Whitaker control over an aspect of her life at a time when so much is out of her control. We would invite the community to volunteer with installation and, once the renovation is complete, we will also host a grand opening ribbon cutting WISH REVEAL party for the community.

Formally, we measure success through our post-Wish survey, which asks families for feedback on their interactions and communication with our staff and volunteers, level of satisfaction with the Wish and whether it met/exceeded expectations, and the overall quality of the Wish experience.

We would be pleased to work with RPCA on other feedback mechanisms/surveys to collect evaluation data of importance to the City and future partnerships and renovations.
