RECREATION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES REPORT

#### Program Wrap-Ups

• RPCA's Annual Basketball Championship took place on March 21 at T.C. Williams High School. This season, each team selected a player from the opposing team who would receive a bracelet stating "RPCA SPORTSMANSHIP PLAYER OF THE GAME" based on sportsmanship, hustle, leadership, conduct and teamwork. The bracelets became an immediate hit with players from all leagues excited to receive them and over 800 distributed. 1,058 participants played in 10 divisions, with \$77,862.50 in revenue.





- So far, **Nerf the Turf** has attracted 257 boys and girls ages 7-12. The winter session saw a 47% increase in participation over the Fall. The winter programing season has generated a total of \$2,295.00. To capitalize on the momentum and the changing of seasons, Nerf the Turf will be taking the action outdoors for Spring!
- The **Out of School Time Program** at Charles Houston Recreation Center has had a great month of STEM activities including a Coke and Mentos Experiment, a Soda Bottle Birdfeeder, a Rainforest Shoebox and Build-A-Rocket. Other activities included Neighborhood Clean-up Day, Ships and Sailors Game, Homerun Derby, Flag Football,

Earth Day Walk, 4-H Club Activities, Soccer, Crafts and an intramural "Hoop Madness" basketball tournament.

- Black History is Everyone's History took place on March 18 at Nannie J. Lee Recreation Center. Youth Achieving Greatness (YAG) and Mainstream program participants sang and danced while teaching the audience about the great accomplishments of historical African Americans. The audience also enjoyed presentations, spoken word and artwork created by significant historical African Americans. Participants ended the performance with a group presentation and reenactment of the March on Selma led by Dr. Martin Luther King.
- The March Egg-ness event took place on March 28 at Charles Houston Recreation Center. A bunny came to town, gave out candy and took pictures with the kids. Children participated in an egg hunt, had their faces painted, played "egg-games", danced and received baskets with trinkets. Refreshments and soft play were also part of the fun. Lil Gymmies and Soft Play have become signature programs for the Charles Houston Recreation Center with 2,763 in attendance fiscal year-to-date.



- In March, the Alexandria Soccer Association conducted a **Soccer Clinic** for 210 OSTP participants from William Ramsay and Patrick Henry Recreation Centers.
- Cora Kelly Recreation Center's Senior Club and Luncheon took place on March 31 as a
  planning session to discuss current and upcoming programs and activities. A guest from
  Wells Fargo Bank led a discussion on Preventing Financial Abuse. The next meeting on
  April 14 will focus on planning the Annual Senior Appreciation Luncheon.
- On March 27, William Ramsay Recreation Center's OSTP participants enjoyed a **March Madness Basketball Tournament**. Youth had a great time while learning the importance of teamwork, cooperation and good sportsmanship.
- Chinquapin Park Recreation Center & Aquatics Facility hosted a Family Fun Night featuring Patrick Henry Elementary School on March 13. Activities included swimming for all ages, beach ball relays, basketball, floating obstacle course, pool safety tips, soccer drills, swimming skill assessments for youth, Wahoos Swim Team sign up, and a Nature Center exhibit. Revenue was \$928 with 232 attendees.





- RPCA offered **Spring Break Camps**, including half and full day Tennis Camps at Chinquapin Park Recreation Center & Aquatics Facility, with 18 total participants. Campers enjoyed instructional tennis in the morning and early afternoon with swimming afterwards. Revenue for the tennis camp was \$5,040. A Spring Break Basketball Camp was also offered, which included a full day of individual drills, group drills and age appropriate scrimmages. Revenue for the basketball camp was \$9,095.
- On March 21, the **SeaPerch Underwater Robotics** program wrapped up at Chinquapin Park Recreation Center & Aquatics Facility. Participants took on the challenge of building their own remote-controlled underwater robots. They had a blast while learning engineering, and finished the last class by testing their robots in an underwater challenge course in the pool. This is a new program, with revenue of \$1,048.



• The City of Alexandria recognized **National Safe Place Week**, March 15-21, with daily themed activities at Safe Place sites to raise awareness about the issues youth face and the resources available in Alexandria. Themed activities included informative presentations to youth enrolled in the OSTP and teens who frequent recreation centers. Staff wore Safe Place yellow to show support, and youth created their own Safe Place banners. Hundreds of City of Alexandria youth participated in Safe Place Week activities.





• On March 20, the MacArthur Power-On Program participated in **Read Across America Day.** This nationwide reading celebration takes place annually, and thousands of schools, libraries, and community centers participate by bringing together kids, teens, and books. Participants were read *The Cat in the Hat*, given the book to take home and actually got to meet Cat in the Hat! What a wonderful experience and great fun for Read Across America Day! Wright to Read sponsored this event.



- On March 9, Nannie J. Lee Recreation Center held **Kids Day Out.** Activities included physical fitness exercises, arts and crafts and group games. Participants also ventured out to the Skate Palace roller-skating rink in Temple Hills, MD. During their visit, they were engaged in skating relay races, sing-a-longs and skating dance-offs. The participants truly had a rolling good time.
- On March 28, Cora Kelly Recreation Center and The National Community Church cosponsored the first annual **Egg-stravaganza** at the Conservatory Center at Four Mile Run Park. Participants indulged in games and activities including multiple egg hunts, a lifesize bunny, face painting, and sack races. Kids enjoyed cotton candy, popcorn and prizes. Approximately 175 people participated.

#### **Upcoming Programs & Events**

• This spring, Charles Barrett Recreation Center will be home to two new programs for fans of epic adventures. April 22 kicks off Nerf Zombie Survival Training! This 5-week program will allow participants ages 7-12 to explore, hunt, scavenge, build and survive in the fictional apocalyptic Zombie City, known as Alexandria. On May 8, Nerf the Turf will take the action outdoors! We will take advantage of the natural elements to play classic Nerf Battles like Cops and Robbers, Jail Break, Water Wars and Manhunt.



- Lil Gymmies' April Carnival Day will take place on April 25 at the Charles Houston Recreation Center. Participants will enjoy face painting, popcorn, snow cones and carnival game fun along with Soft Play.
- Family Fun Night will take place on April 24, at the Chinquapin Park Recreation Center & Aquatics Facility and will feature William Ramsay Elementary School. Activities will include swimming for all ages, beach ball relays, basketball, floating obstacle course, pool safety tips, and soccer drills, swimming skill assessments for youth, summer camp information, Nature Center animals, and Wahoos Swim Team sign ups.
- Miracle League Opening Day Ceremony will take place April 24 & 25 at Kelly Cares Miracle Field. The Miracle League of Alexandria (MLA) provides youth and adults with mental and/or physical challenges, or those looking for an alternative to competitive sports programs, an environment where they can play at their own pace. Participants can develop self-esteem, learn new skills, get some exercise, make friends and have fun.
- On April 29, **Girls' Fast Pitch Softball** will hold its opening night ceremony at Witter Recreational Park to honor the 2015 players, coaches and sponsors.
- Mount Vernon Recreation Center will host its **Mother's Day Tea** on May 2. Formerly known as the Mother Daughter Tea, this event is now extended to the entire family and will include a guest speaker, light refreshments, and a special gift for each mother.

#### **Staff Updates**

- **Domenique Simpson** of Chinquapin Park Recreation Center & Aquatics Facility was named Employee of the Month for March for displaying exceptional skill and compassion while teaching youth to swim. Domenique continues to exceed expectations by carrying large class rosters, touching the lives of over 100 children and their families each weekend.
- In-Service Training for Pool Safety Personnel occurred on March 22.
- Over 100 staff members have received **Safe Place Training** and certification since January.

#### **Admin Updates**

• Picnic Reservations for Fort Ward, Ben Brenman, Joseph Hensley, Chinquapin and the newly renovated Armistead Booth Park began during March. Our parks and picnic areas are the backdrop of many family reunions, graduations and birthday parties. New collateral has been developed to be posted in parks and recreation centers encouraging residents to consider our beautiful parks for their next opportunity to create memories. This amenity is only available to residents and businesses located in the City of Alexandria. Revenues to date are \$10,575, which is 50% higher than this time last year.



• The **2015-2016 Alexandria City Public Schools Space Use Request** was submitted to ACPS for review and approval per the City-Schools Facility and Outdoor Maintenance and Use Agreement.

#### 1. PARK AND FACILITIES MAINTENANCE

#### • Snow/Ice Operations

2014-15 was the second consecutive year of above-average snow fall in the region. We concluded this operation with no reportable injury or accidents. RPCA and Transportation and Environmental Services (T&ES) held a staff appreciation breakfast to recognize staff efforts and the teamwork to support City's snow/ice operations.

#### • Spring Season

As we move into another grass cutting, landscaping and heavy park use season, staff is working on multiple spring cleaning and park preparation projects including, the next phase of the park furniture replacement in many parks across the City, ball field preparations, new park openings, turf maintenance and preparations for the picnic uses.

#### • Landscaping and Grounds Maintenance Contract

A new contract was awarded to a private firm for the landscaping and grounds maintenance services at 217 different public sites across the City, including schools, recreation centers, parks, cemeteries, libraries, public rights-of-way, City entrance ways and other public buildings. Staff will be posting the monthly schedule of these services by locations on RPCA's web site to alert the public and the facility users. City Council approved provision of these contracted services as part of the FY 2015 Operating Budget.

#### • EPA Inspection of Park Facilities

The Environmental Protection Agency inspectors visited park facilities on March 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> to assess facilities, maintenance procedures, and record-keeping associated with

the City's storm water permit and pollution prevention programs. RPCA's reviews were positive and reflected our commitment to best practices for environmental accountability which includes the implementation of the Environmental Sustainability Management System (ESMS).

#### Annual Training and Field Day

Staff has been preparing for the Second Annual Spring Field Day and Equipment Rodeo for the Park Operations staff to be held on April 22<sup>nd</sup> at Witter Field. Dedicated to promoting safety, working efficiently and striving for excellent customer service, the staff will participate in a day of training that will focus on team building, safe equipment operation and providing a safe and neat environment for our customers (park users). The Field Day activities include safety presentations, equipment demonstrations, equipment operation competitions, employee recognitions, and some fun "Team Building" exercises.

#### • Park Maintenance

- o In conjunction with the Lieutenant Jeff Taylor, from the City's Fire Department, the flag pole at Four Mile Run Park was repaired and a new Flag was flown preparing for "Opening Day" of the spring baseball and softball season.
- In preparation for the up coming garden season, staff completed the extension of the irrigation line at Chinquapin Garden, removed all trash and debris from the Holmes Run Gardens and reinforced the wooden enclouser.
- Staff installed a soft trail that connected the Witter parking lot to 2900 Business
   Center Drive. This project showed the diverse skills set of our staff.
- o Staff continues to work on park light inspection and timer management.
- Staff continues to work on de-winterization for irrigation systems and water fountains. The de-winterization schedule is expected to be completed by the end of April.
- Park Shop staff continues to work on equipment conversion, general inspection and corrective maintenance for all turf equipment in preparation for the growing season. Currently, 85% of all equipment is ready for the growing season.
- o Staff started the third annual playground safety inspections.

#### New Braddock Road Interim Park

Braddock Rd Interim Park opened on March30th providing additional recreational oppurtunities for it's surrounding neighbors. Activites include joggle boards, bocce ball, horse shoes, ping pond table, picnic tables and open space.

#### • Adopt-a-Park Program

Staff held a welcome orientation to kick-off the 2015 season which began April 1<sup>st</sup>. Participants were given the opportunity to meet fellow groups and program representatives. Awards for the 2014 program are being distributed now. The Adopt-a-Park program was also featured in a recent Washington Post article. The article focused on the many benefits the program has to offer the Community.

#### 2. NATURAL LANDS MANAGEMENT

#### • <u>Invasive Plant Management</u>

- Staff organized and supervised the second successful Friends of Monticello Park English Ivy Removal Workday of the year on March 22, 2015 a collaborative effort with the Alexandria birding community; Arlington Regional Master Naturalists; Tree Stewards of Arlington and Alexandria; Master Gardeners of Northern Virginia; and Alexandria residents. App. 3,000 sq. ft. of English Ivy and Wintercreeper was removed from the park. Staff also removed app. 1,600 sq. ft. of Wineberry from the dog exercise area at the park and planted 6 Spicebush shrubs along bare areas of the stream bank.
- Staff supervised our specialist non-native invasive plant contractor in the largescale treatment of Lesser Celandine at a number of stream valley parks.

#### • <u>Cooperative Initiatives</u>

- Staff assisted Virginia State Botanist John Townsend with Virginia DCR, Natural Heritage Division, in providing collection and location information on historical Alexandria and vicinity collections.
- City of Alexandria Herbarium (AVCH) sent 40 Hawthorne (*Crataegus* spp.)
   specimens collected from Alexandria and environs, as well as 5 Arlington County
   specimens and one from Fairfax County, to Hawthorne specialist Ron Lance at
   Western Carolina University Herbarium (WCUH) for expert identification.
- City Natural Resource Manager and Plant Ecologist Rod Simmons assisted in teaching NVCC Alexandria Campus Environmental Science Instructor Dr. Christine Bozarth's Tree Community Labs at Dora Kelley Nature Park on March 31 and April 2.

#### Outreach

- O Natural Resource Technician Scott Graham gave a "Non-Native Invasive Plant Workshop" at the Ford Nature Center on March 21.
- City Natural Resource Manager and Plant Ecologist Rod Simmons led a "Native Plant Identification Field Trip" on March 21 through the eastern section of the Holmes Run Gorge at Dora Kelley Nature Park and upstream into the Fairfax County section of the Gorge.

#### Environmental Review

Staff reviewed the scope of work and advised contractors as to pre-construction non-native invasive plant removal work at Four Mile Run Park for the first phase of the lower Four Mile Run Restoration Project; staff checked the Limits of Disturbance (LOD) and flagged the existing, protected freshwater tidal wetlands on site; staff delineated and flagged the remnant forested tidal wetlands at the southwest corner of the project area.

#### **3.** URBAN FORESTRY MANAGEMENT

#### • Street Tree Maintenance

Pro-active street tree maintenance projects have begun along several of Alexandria's main thoroughfares, including: Duke Street from South Henry Street west to Van Dorn Street; West Street from King Street north to Madison Street; and Edsall Road from South Van Dorn Street west to the city limits. This work will include the removal of deadwood, crossing over and week branch structure, the removal of low limbs interfering with pedestrian and vehicular traffic and minor thinning of dense branch structure as needed. Edge clean up and tree maintenance is on-going along East and West Timber Branch Parkways, and West Taylor Run. This work will eliminate branches and developing saplings that are growing into the rights of way and interfering with traffic.

#### Public Outreach

The City Arborist conducted a spring tree walk for the Tree Stewards of Arlington and Alexandria in Fort Ward Park on March 21<sup>st</sup>. Approximately twenty Tree Stewards participated in a discussion about many of the unique specimens in the park, factors that affect their development and tree maintenance as they walked around the six tenths of a mile loop road. Several tree walks are conducted for groups and interested parties at Fort Ward, and on Capitol Hill throughout the year.

#### • Tree City USA and other Awards

The City of Alexandria will be recognized as a TREE CITY USA by the Arbor Day Foundation at the City's Earth Day Celebration on April 25 at Ben Brenman Park. This will be the thirty first consecutive years that the city has received this honor. In order to be designated a TREE CITY, a municipality must have a Tree Board or Department assigned to manage the City's tree program, a Community Ordinance to protect the City's trees on public land, a budget dedicated to planting and maintaining its trees, and an Arbor Day Observance including an Arbor Day Proclamation and a tree planting ceremony. In addition to the TREE CITY USA awards, Alexandria has also received two GROWTH AWARDS from the Arbor Day Foundation for the City's commitment to maintain and promote a healthy urban forest. Arbor Day in Virginia is officially recognizes on the third Friday in the month of April; this year on April 17<sup>th</sup>.

#### 4. JEROMEN "BUDDIE" FORD NATURE CENTER

#### Programs

The staff of the Jerome "Buddie" Ford Nature Center conducted 79 interpretive programs in March that were attended by 1,709 participants. This included two birthday parties, Spring Break Camp and three large outreach events. Attendance for visitors to the Nature Center was 616 additional people.

- o Family Fun Night: On March 13, Family Fun Night was held at Chinquapin Park Recreation Center. Program Coordinator, Majd Jarrar represented the Nature Center at this monthly event. The more than 230 visitors were introduced to a few of the Nature Center animals as well as learned about the various programs, camps, birthday rentals and Afterschool programs that are offered to the public. See photo below:
- O Science and Engineering Night at Mount Vernon Elementary School: On Friday, March 20, Mount Vernon Elementary School held its annual Science and Engineering Night. Earlier attempts to have this event in January and February were changed twice due to the extreme cold and snowy weather. The Nature Center exhibit displayed native frogs and toads. Naturalist, Jane Yeingst also exhibited information and photographs of conservation efforts throughout the world to protect endangered amphibians. More than 150 children and parents attended this event. See photos below:
- o Reading is Fundamental (RIF): Douglas MacArthur Elementary School invited the Nature Center to conduct fifteen minute programs throughout the day for their yearly Reading is Fundamental (RIF) event. This year's focus was "Wild about Books" The classes saw examples of "wild" animals including fire bellied toads, a Mali uromastyx, a tangerine milk snake, Chinese paddle tail newt and a fat tailed African gecko. The entire student body- 765 children, learned about exotic animals from the Nature Center's collection. A total of 23 short programs were given on that day. See photos below:

#### • Volunteers and Interns

A total of 4 volunteers provided 58 hours of service during the month of March. Two students from the International Academy at TC Williams High School continue to intern at the Nature Center. In addition, a 10<sup>th</sup> student from Lake Braddock Secondary School volunteers every Saturday. He has been assisting with animal care and greenhouse maintenance.

#### Staff Training

- o *Interaction and Diversity in the Forest:* On March 7<sup>th</sup>, Majd Jarrar attended the day long Virginia Native Plant Society Workshop held at the University of Richmond on "Interaction and Diversity in the Forest". Presentations included topics on the effects of Garlic Mustard on our native plant communities, and how the perennial woodland herbs are surviving the overabundance of whitetails.
- o White Tail Deer Management: On March 23<sup>rd</sup>, Majd Jarrar attended the Capital Region Invasive Pest Symposium on "White Tail Deer Management". The all day program was held at Prince William Forest Park. This included a discussion on the strategies and issues within the Capital Region. Topics included as the influences of overabundant herbivores and invasive plants on native Mid-Atlantic forest communities. The meeting focused on the importance of educating the

- public on current issues pertaining to the results of the overabundance of deer through various outreach programs and events.
- O Amphibian Management School: Naturalist, Jane Yeingst attended the week long (March 9-13) Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) Amphibian Management School at The Detroit Zoo. This zoo is unique because it is one of the few zoos in the world that has separate house dedicated to amphibians as well as being a center for research, management and breeding of many amphibians. This program covered many topics including the value of amphibians, taxonomy, the global extinction crisis, husbandry, captive breeding, diet and live food culturing, medical practices, water quality, interpretation, conservation and exhibit design. On the last day, the group traveled to the Detroit River to monitor mudpuppies (the largest salamander in Michigan- growing up to a length of 16 inches).

#### CITY COUNCIL TO CONSIDER TWO PARK NAMINGS

The City Naming Committee met on Monday, April 13 and unanimously endorsed the naming of two parks, for Judith "Judy" Utterback Lowe and Nancy Dunning. The two proposals will be considered by City Council in May.

• Rename 1 & 7 East Del Ray Pocket Park to honor Judith "Judy" Utterback Lowe Judith "Judy" Utterback Lowe loved Alexandria and the Del Ray neighborhood. She believed intensely in preserving and enhancing a sense of community. Judy was well known as the "First Lady of Del Ray," because of her involvement in many civic activities. While alive, Judy appreciated the fact that it was a grassroots effort of neighborhood activists who convinced the City to buy the land at 1 & 7 E. Del Ray Ave. for the creation of a neighborhood pocket park. After her death, the Del Ray Citizens Association collected \$7,500 for a memorial to Judy, and Del Ray Citizens Association members agreed that investing the money in the pocket park would be the kind of neighborhood-oriented decision Judy would have championed. In 2013, the Del Ray Citizens Association and the City agreed to a public-private partnership to pay for further construction of the community-supported park design.

#### • Name Park Parcel in Memory of Nancy Dunning

More than 25 years ago when "The Avenue" was boarded up buildings with very few shops, residents had little reason to walk around. Nancy Dunning, known as the "Queen of Del Ray," saw a different Avenue and dedicated her life to see it blossom and thrive. She worked tirelessly to lay the groundwork for Del Ray to become what it is today. More than 10 years since her death, friends and family still hear new stories of acts of kindness that Nancy performed before her death. She had a heart of gold and always went out of her way to help someone in need. The Del Ray Business Association is

proud to recommend that one of the entrances to the heart of the Del Ray Business District be named after Nancy Dunning.

#### WINDMILL HILL PARK SHORELINE REHABILITATION

The City of Alexandria hosted a public information meeting to present conceptual design options illustrating proposed improvements to the Potomac River shoreline along Windmill Hill Park, 501 S. Union St. on Monday, April 13. This is the second in a series of community meetings planned during the concept development phase of this project. As a result of the two community meetings, the public consensus is for staff to recommend to City Council for the construction of a Living Shoreline (attached). Consideration by City Council is planned for June 2015.

#### **Beverly Park Renovation**

The firm Andropogon, Inc. of Philadelphia, PA was selected to complete the concept design for the one-acre park. A meeting with the consultant will be held early Spring 2015.

At the meeting Alexandria City Public Schools and Recreation, Parks & Cultural Activities staff presented initial site studies related to feasibility of the construction of new school and recreation center. Staff presented an overview of the feasibility study to the Youth Sports Advisory Board on April 13.
