Program Wrap-Ups

- On November 20, the Leonard "Chick" Armstrong Advisory Council partnered to host their **Annual Community Thanksgiving Dinner**. Dinner was prepared by local restaurants and served to 140 attendees. The program included a fashion show by the OSTP youth, cheerleaders and senior line dance class and recognition of partners.
- On December 7, RPCA with the Successful Aging Committee hosted a Senior Holiday Luncheon for 200 attendees at Lee Center. Participants enjoyed holiday festivities including music by the Route 66 Band and a visit from Mayor Allison Silberberg who joined the band on stage for an impromptu rendition of "Sweet Caroline."



- On December 14, Leonard "Chick" Armstrong Recreation Center partnered with the Department of Community & Human Services to host a **Community Toy Drive**. While parents picked up toys, youth made crafts and enjoyed a snack with Santa. This year, 450 low-income families received toys, which is 150 more families than last year.
- On December 14, **Kid Rock Social Hour** held their holiday program at Mount Vernon Recreation Center. Over 40 participants enjoyed pizza while visiting Santa.
- On December 16, Samuel Tucker Elementary School hosted the **Fire Fighter & Friends Holiday Toy Drive**. Over 2,000 toys donated by Toys 4 Tots and other local businesses and organizations were distributed to 300 families across the City.

- On December 17, the Youth Sports section hosted the **40**th **Annual Holiday Cheerleading Competition** at T.C. Williams High School. Thirteen teams participated at various skill levels and guest performers included Trinity Patterson and T.C Williams High School Cheerleaders. Consistent with the previous year, attendance exceeded 400.
- On December 19, Charles Houston Recreation Center hosted **ARHA's Annual Santa's Winter Wonderland.** 350 Alexandrians attended to visit with Santa and the Grinch and 50 more participants received toys and books than last year.
- On December 16, the Classes & Camps section hosted its inaugural end of season Winter Dance Recital for 200 attendees. Sixty-six dancers ages 3-8 performed winter/holiday themed dances from Pre-Ballet and Movement, Ballet I, and Go Bananas Tap and Jazz class. Due to the success of the performance and positive responses from families, Spring and Winter end of season dance performances will continue.
- On December 20, Out of School Time youth at Leonard "Chick" Armstrong Recreation Center participated in a Holiday Celebration with Santa. Community Police Officers and seniors provided holiday music, a sing-along, toy giveaways, DJ music, contests and a farewell song to Santa for 168 participants (48 more than last year).





Program Updates

 On January 11, the Classes & Camps section hosted their first Fantastic Friday at Oswald Durant Arts Center. Once a month, this program will feature a current program offering, introducing families to the great program options without the full session commitment. January introduced Little Hands Music with "Winter Wonderland" themed music and movement time with snowmen, skating, snow songs and activities.

- On February 3, Leonard "Chick" Armstrong Recreation Center will host **Super Bowl 52 Countdown Celebration**. A full day of activities leading up to the big game will include a flag football game, football trivia, and previous super bowl highlights.
- On February 8, Leonard "Chick" Armstrong Recreation Center will hold a **Spotlight Line Dance Party!** Adults will learn basic line dance steps and easy routines and enjoy good food and company. No prior dance experience is needed.

SUBJECT: PARK OPERATIONS MONTHLY UPDATE

1. PARK AND FACILITIES MAINTENANCE

a. Park Maintenance

- As part of the seasonal trail maintenance work, staff completed the renovation of the trail in Taney Avenue Park. Work included removal of all weeds and replenishing of stone dust and wood chips on the trail surface.
- New playground project in Simpson Park is nearing completion with the installation of the new interactive art and the park equipment.
- The plaza and the seating area at 3550 Commonwealth Avenue Park were opened for public use on November 30th. The lawn area is closed to foot traffic while the recently seeded turf has time to establish.
- All-natural turf fields throughout the City have been closed for the winter season. Prior to the closing of the fields, staff aerated, seeded, and installed turf blankets to help reestablish and promote healthy turf for the opening of the spring season.
- Staff completed ADA parking requirements for the Oronoco Bay Park by adding an ADA van accessible space. Staff also completed the drainage improvement project in this park the pooling of water was eliminated by raising the level of the area by 8 inches and re-sodding the ground.

- Founders Park trail edge pavers were reset even with the ground to improve safety of users and the appearance of the trail.
- Staff provided support for the First Night Alexandria showcases and helped clean-up after two waterfront flooding events.
- Many staff completed First Aid, CPR, AED and Van Driving training and certifications.
- Staff completed the installation of the holiday decorations in Market Square and other logistical support for the Annual Tree Lighting event.
- Windmill Hill Park had its opening ceremony on November 17th. Staff completed the coordination of the maintenance responsibilities with Park Planning, Dept. of Project Implementation (DPI) and the Contractor. This park offers an open dog park, the first 2 kayak launches along the entire waterfront, a wooden bridge over a decorative stream, a native shoreline for when tide levels rise, and much more.

b. Park Facilities Maintenance

- Fort Ward Park pedestrian bridge adjacent to Oakland Baptist Cemetery was renovated with the replacement of the decaying structural and other bridge components and raising of the access gravel paths flush with the bridge's decking. The entire structure was carefully pressure washed to receive light staining and clear sealant. Project goal was to retain bridge's original rustic character and ensure a structurally sound conveyance structure for park patrons.
- African American Heritage Park's Restoration is now completed pending final City approval. Staff oversaw restoration to the Gazebo brick paver ramp, new stone dust infill at pathways, reinstallation of Seneca stone at cheek-walls, repointing flagstone pavers, installation and restoration of field drains, and other improvements. In coordination with OHA, staff also rotated the interpretive "book" pedestal for easier access and is currently replacing the damaged glass cover with new non-breakable glazing.
- African American Heritage Park's Memorial Gazebo restoration project encompasses two phases: The initial phase, creation of as -built construction documents, was completed through services of B.E.I., a local engineering consultant. The second phase, actual restoration work, will commence during

- January and project completion by March, 2019. Staff is overseeing both phases in coordination with OHA.
- Minnie Howard restroom replacement project design work has been awarded to an engineering and landscape architecture firm. Construction work is projected to take place in summer, 2019.
- During the month of November, staff concentrated mainly on completing the winterization to all the irrigation systems, drinking water fountains, nonheated public restrooms and community gardens. Additionally, staff performed scheduled light bulbs replacements at tennis courts and sport fields.
- Conversion of mowing equipment for snow operations has been completed along with pre-season checks on vehicle mounted snow equipment.
- Organization of the warehouse in progress, ensuring that LEAN 6S principles are in place. Also, LEAN 6S training was conducted to facilitate process improvements in other lines of businesses within RPCA.
- Seasonal supplies and materials are fully stocked in the warehouse in preparation for the winter season.

2. NATURAL RESOURCES MANAGEMENT

a. Urban Forestry

- A New Holiday Tree at Market Square Washington Post listed this tree as the top-5 holiday trees to visit in the DC metro area. The annual Holiday Tree lighting occurred on November 23rd with a new artificial Carolina Tower tree - 40 feet tall and has 38.150 LED wide angle lights. The decision to purchase an artificial tree was made as the availability of fresh cut trees becomes more of a challenge, and their cost continues to rise. The replaceable lights and branches of the artificial tree are expected to last five to seven seasons. The steel frame will last much longer with proper care.
- FY 2019 Tree Planting As of the end of December, 625 trees were planted. We are on target to meet our goal of 1,000 trees planting in FY 2019.
- Tree City USA The City of Alexandria has once again qualified as a Tree City USA for calendar year 2018. This the 36th consecutive award received from the National Arbor Day Foundation, which recognizes Alexandria as a community that is committed to Holiday tree lighting in Market Square

maintaining the health of its urban forest and expanding its tree canopy.

b. Horticulture

- The 2018 community garden season was closed out and the staff coordinate the 2019 season registration renewal process for Chinquapin and Holmes Run community gardens. Both gardens retained more than 60% of their respective gardeners. Continued interest in the community gardens increased the number of residents currently on the community garden waiting list. New applicant registrations will be completed in January.
- Staff continued to participate in the Landscape Guidelines review including the native plant's discussion.
- Staff oversaw leaf removal and the first winter inspections of all landscaped sites by the City's landscape contractor.

c. Natural Land Management

Invasive Plant Management & Restoration

- Staff hand-pulled thousands of Burning Bush, Longbristled Smartweed, Porcelain-berry, Oriental Bittersweet, and other non-native invasive weeds from Dora Kelley Nature Park, Chinquapin Park, and Forest Park, as well as picked up litter and debris from the Eisenhower Avenue- Mill Road bank, Telegraph and Duke Meadow Complex and Beatley Library Meadow.
- Staff supervised our contractor, Invasive Plant Control (IPC), in treating Porcelain-berry, Bush Honeysuckle, English Ivy, Bisset Bamboo, Golden Groove Bamboo, and many other non-native invasive plants at Angel Park, Backlick Run stream banks at Ben Brenman Park, Fort Williams Park, INOVA Alexandria Hospital Scenic Easement East, Forest Park, Chambliss Park, and Rynex Natural Area.
- On November 17, 2018, TreeStewards of Arlington and Alexandria, residents and volunteers, and staff planted 53 site-appropriate native trees throughout Ben Brenman Park. A total of 27 volunteers contributed 110.5 volunteer hours to the project.
- Staff installed 17 site-appropriate native trees and shrubs along the Mill Road-Eisenhower Avenue road bank.

Cooperative Initiatives

- On December 12-14, 2018, City Natural Resource Manager presented "The Importance of a Large-Scale Non-Native Invasive Plant Control Program in Effectively Managing Natural Lands" at the "Innovations in Invasive Species Management" conference in Nashville, Tennessee. Approximately 300 attended the conference.
- Staff shared information regarding Alexandria's native flora and natural communities with the Mount Vernon Unitarian Church, who are interested in providing information to congregants about resources available in their Alexandria and Fairfax communities as part of a new green initiative.
- On December 18, 2018, staff hosted a public meeting at 2900-A Business Center Drive to discuss the process for establishing natural areas in parks and seek comments on the draft Natural Resources Management Plan.
- On December 21, 2018, City Natural Resource Manager met with the Porto Vecchio Waterfront Committee onsite to discuss freshwater tidal wetland communities adjoining the condominium grounds, ideas for ecological restoration plantings along their shoreline, and onsite locations for groundwater infiltration.

Environmental Review

- Staff provided discussion and review of Alexandria Country Day School's proposal for outdoor classroom opportunities at Monticello Park.
- Staff reviewed the Final Draft Natural Resource Management Plan before posting online for public comments.
- Staff reviewed and discussed the conceptual proposals for stream restoration projects at Strawberry Run/Fort Williams Park and Taylor Run/Chinquapin Park.
- Staff reviewed the native plant list and landscape details for the revised Landscape Guidelines.
- Staff reviewed the list of native and exotic trees for the revision of the Urban Forestry

3. JEROME "BUDDIE" FORD NATURE CENTER

a. Programs/Updates

• For the months of November/December, there were 182 interpretive programs attended by 3,392 people. The combined total number of visitors and participants was 4,224 people.

School Programs

For the months of November/December, the Naturalists conducted 25 school programs for 1,790 students, teachers and parents.

- November 13 and 14- The Naturalist staff conducted six outreach programs at Patrick Henry Elementary School. More than 130 kindergarten students and teachers were introduced to "Signs of Fall".
- November 29 For the fifth year, the Nature Center was invited to participate in "Science Night" at MacArthur Elementary School. The staff shared information about "Threatened Amphibians".
- Examples from the center's collection included an American toad, spotted salamander, Chinese warty newt and an axolotl. More than 1,500 students and their parents attended this event.
- December 7- Naturalist staff visited over 100 MacArthur Elementary kindergarteners for 6 programs on Senses.
- During the month of December, 3 kindergarten classes from Ramsay ES visited the Nature Center for their biweekly visits. Using specimens from the Nature Center's collection, they learned about living and nonliving things.

Nature Center Programs

During the months of November/December, there were 9 birthday parties,91 impromptu programs, 4 weekday programs for preschool age children, 2 private school kindergarten program, an evening meeting for the Parks and Recreation Commission and a full day program "School's Out, Nature's In" conducted on a school holiday. The total participation for these programs was 1,398 people.

• November 17- The "Winter Blossoms" was conducted on Saturday, November 17. The 13 children and parents learned about the history of bulbs.

- December 1- The Nature Center continued its Green Craft series by making all-natural body butters and colorful bath bombs. This program was attended by 16 participants.
- December 14 In our final meeting for the Fall session, the Little Adventures group explored the diet of black bears. They searched the nature center for black bear "food" and made their own black bears to take home.

Outreach Programs

- December 5 A naturalist visited the 2nd and 3rd graders at Grace Episcopal School for a program on Native Plants and Animals.
- December 18 The Nature Center visited Sunrise Senior Living and presented a nature program for 8 adults.

Afterschool Buddies Program

The Nature Buddies dove deep into an ocean theme this November/December! They learned about the different aquatic zones and the flora and fauna that live in each. They also explored oceanic food webs to better understand the connections between underwater creatures. They concluded the unit with a SOL-based game of Jeopardy.

b. Volunteers and Interns

• A total of 24 volunteers provided 192 hours of service during the months of November/December.

c. Noteworthy

- Fall Native Plant Sale: The total number of plants sold this year was 150 30 more plants than last year. The varieties that were offered were white oak, spicebush, black gum, persimmon, New Jersey tea and flowering dogwood.
- *New Animals:* Our new specimens include 7 fire-bellied toads and 2 spotted newts which are now on exhibit at the center.

3550 COMMONWEALTH AVENUE PARK RENOVATION

On November 30, 2018, Rebuilding Together Alexandria, Former Mayor Allison Silberberg, City Manager Mark Jinks, RPCA, and neighbors cut the ribbon to commemorate completion of the park renovations. The renovation was made possible by a Neighborworks grant awarded to Rebuilding Together Alexandria. The renovations include new plaza, lawn, picnic area, trike path, and plantings. Flowers and shrubs were specially planted by volunteers from Fannie Mae.



LANDSCAPE GUIDELINES UPDATE

The City of Alexandria approved the original Landscape Guidelines in 1997 and updated the document in 2007. The 2018 Update was presented to the Park and Recreation Commission on October 18 and released for public comment on October 19. The public comment period closed November 16. Staff presented the draft to several commissions, boards, and community groups. Community feedback, including feedback from commissions, landscape architecture firms, and individuals, is included in a revised draft, which will be presented to Planning Commission and City Council in February 2019. PATRICK HENRY K-8 SCHOOL & RECREATION CENTER

SIMPSON PARK PLAYGROUND AND LAWN RENOVATION

In December 2018, City Council received a recommendation from the City Council Naming Committee and approved the consolidation of the Interim King St. Park, 1 & 2 King St. and the existing Waterfront Park, 1A Prince St. into one park named Waterfront Park. Final work is near completion on the new portion of Waterfront and it is anticipated the park will open for continuous use to the public in early February 2019. Final preparations for power to the park will continue through February with completion scheduled in early March 2019.
