- To show up. Encourage people with good ideas.
- To be informed and educated about an issue and listen to other people's point of view.
- A lot of work and thought.
- Information, accuracy, perspective.

Show up and have a thoughtful and informed opinion or suggestion. Be willing to politely express your opinions without undue emotion.

- To be listened to. Feedback that you have been understood and an action response.
- Timely and accurate response.
- Community dinners.
- A timely response with a clear discussion of points considered and a recommended path forward.
- Respect, genuine listening, open mind not deciding on something then asking.
- That the city will be truthful about listening and not going thru the motions to mark a check box.
- To see results of coming together, of seeing solutions to problems.

That there is a genuine opportunity to make a difference and that the response respects that. Progress is made toward solving the problem/issue.
