# Ground Rules

- Stick to the **task at hand** – follow the **agenda**
- Treat each other with **respect**

- No one will characterize other people's view in or outside of the meeting

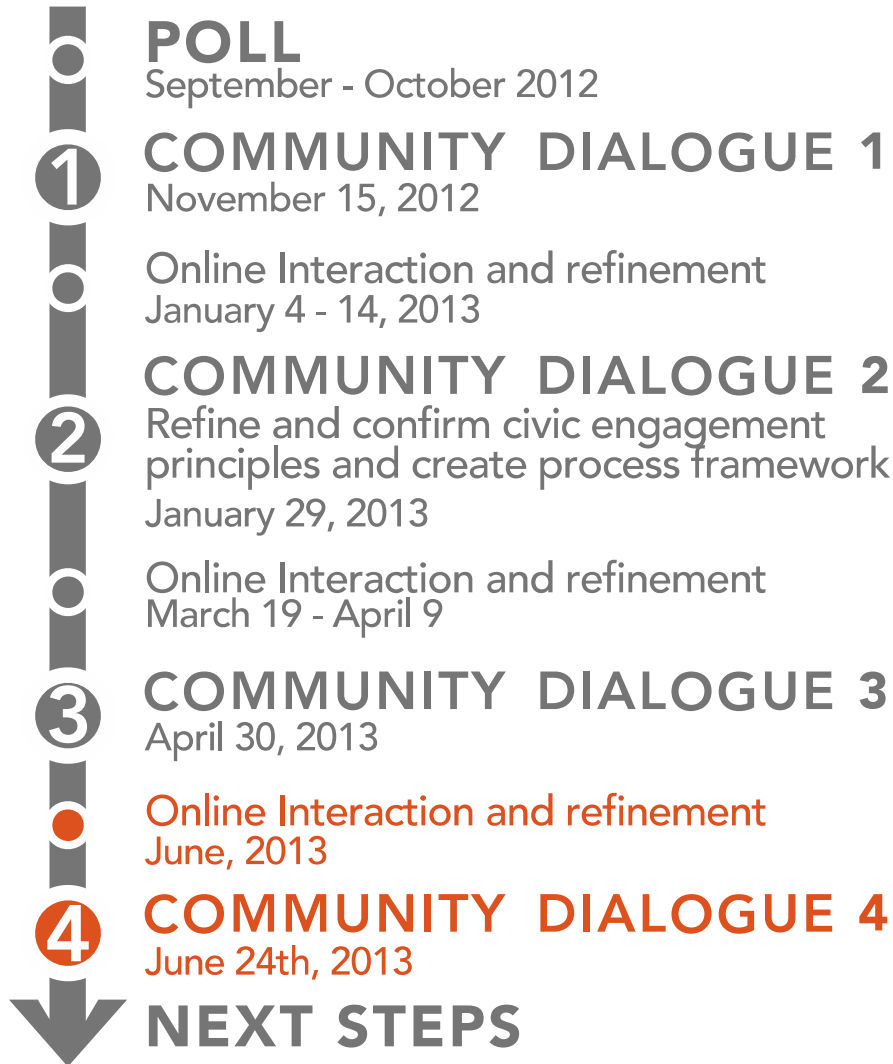


# What We Heard: 4/30 Evaluation

- More **outreach/diversity of involvement** in this process – not just cultural; also, age, economic status, community groups, etc.
- Accessibility – i.e., make **it less complicated**; **simplify language**; need more documents **translated into Spanish**; different locations for meetings; more access to information
- The **clarity** of the process **needs improvement**.
- **students** in the city want to be **kept informed** of local issues/what is happening in their city government.
- How will all of this **work be communicated** to the public-at-large and implemented? Are all city organizations working together toward a common goal?
- Community **ambassadors will help** with neighborhood/city communications.
- Everyone's participation will bring **success**.

# Handbook - Framework

Why it's needed:

- **Consistency** throughout City government
- **Shared understanding** of what to expect (phases, engagement strategies, tools, deliverables)
- Build **trust** and **transparency**

How it will be used:

- **Each** project has a *Civic Engagement Framework* that the community helps to create
- Content includes: Project **goal**, **timeline**, **deliverables** for each phase, and **tools** and **activities** required to accomplish goal

### Key Principles:

Meaningful Engagement

### Engagement Activities:

- Hold public meetings that are well-organized and include group work to hear community opinions
- Collect research and identify community concerns
- Educate community on important issues about the project (online and in person)
- Reach out to the community to encourage participation (phone calls, door knocks, flyers, online)
- Visit a project location as a group

### Tools:

- Offer online participation (surveys, forums, social media)
- Use graphics, maps, 3D models, & pictures to explain project

### Products:

- Community engagement plan  
A preliminary report that describes the project, schedule, tasks, and budget
- Clear goals for each step of the process that must be met before moving to the next step
- Community's list of issues to address and their view of what we should be working toward

### Key Principles:

### Engagement Activities:

- Hold public meetings that are well-organized and include group work to hear community opinions
- Provide information about options, including what has worked well in other places
- Research possible options and potential impacts

### Tools:

- Offer online participation (surveys, forums, social media)
- Hold group meetings with people who are affected by project
- Use graphics, maps, 3D models, & pictures to explain project

### Products:

- Short term report with realistic options for achieving the shared view
- Provide tools to help the community choose between the options

### Key Principles:

Transparency  
Easy Participation  
Sustained Collaboration  
Mutual Accountability  
Meaningful Engagement

### Engagement Activities:

- Hold public meetings that are well-organized and include group work to hear community opinions
- Present final options and how/why they were selected
- Hold public hearings where community members can make statements for City officials to consider, revise, and/or approve

### Tools:

- Offer online participation (surveys, forums, social media)
- Hold group meetings with people affected by project
- Hold meetings open to the public for elected officials to hear comments and make decisions

### Products:

- Report with options that have been reviewed and chosen; Report will show how community ideas guided the final recommendation, and will include the proposed plan and schedule to complete the work

### Key Principles:

Transparency  
Meaningful Engagement  
Sustained Collaboration  
Mutual Accountability  
Evaluation

### Engagement Activities:


- Offer visits to project sites as needed
- Evaluate how well the plan is being carried out
- Identify someone from the City who is responsible for the work and who citizens can call
- Involve the community in carrying out the plan in each phase of the process

### Tools:

- Provide a schedule of project activities to carry out the plan
- Notify community about public meetings

### Products:

- Use objective measurements to determine if the community engagement in the decision-making process was successful
- Provide regular progress reports



# Handbook: Tools & Strategies for Meaningful Engagement

- Before event: *early notice, clear agendas* and *access* to background information
- Type of event: what's *most productive* for issue at hand? In person or online? Workshop, town hall or open house?
- After event: prompt *follow up, show* how *input* is shaping next steps
- Communications *toolbox* – what works best for broad participation?



# Handbook: Implementation & Evaluation

## Implementation

- Develop first year **action plan**
- **Training** for staff and community to improve **engagement** skills
- **Ingrain WNA principles and framework** into City government culture

## Evaluation

- Evaluate *both* **individual** meetings *and* **overall** success of engagement for **each** project
- Establish criteria, process for **annual** evaluation



# Upcoming projects

Upcoming projects will follow the principles, framework and guidelines in the handbook, including:

- Public Art Master Plan
- Eisenhower West Transportation Study and Small Area Plan
- Stormwater Management Plan
- Bicycle Master Plan



# Handbook – Successful Outcomes

- Working **together** to solve common problems.
- Public is **well informed**, has a clear **understanding** of how to participate.
- More people **participate** in (and benefit from) City decisions.
- Community takes an **active role** in organizing others.
- City **decisions/actions** are accepted because they **reflect** public **participation** in a transparent process.
- Engagement approach is **consistent** throughout City government.
- Community and government have **mutual** trust.

October: Council Adoption

Ongoing: Implementation, Training, Monitoring, Evaluation
