



Remediate Alexandria's
Combined Sewer Outfalls

AlexRenew and the National Park Service (NPS) seeks your input.

Alexandria's century-old combined sewer system consists of only one pipe that conveys both sanitary sewage and captured rainwater. On sunny days, all sewage flows to the AlexRenew's Water Resource Recovery Facility. When it rains, the pipes can become overwhelmed with a mixture of sewage and rainwater, which is discharged into our waterways via four permitted outfalls.

We've received significant feedback to date - comment period remains open through October 25th

Over 50 written comments received as of 10/10

- Community preference toward Potomac-Church tunnel route for 001/2
- Strong community preference for locating the Outfall 002 Diversion Facility as far south as possible (not at Green Street)
- Community supports shallow options for Outfalls 003/4 with preference toward open-cut along Hooffs Run
- Concerns regarding truck traffic and contaminated soil/groundwater

"By far, the least disruptive and most advantageous option is the Hooffs Run Option. It also gives the opportunity to remediate that beautiful waterway."

It seems the [Royal Street] staging area will impact St.
Mary School less. That should probably be the most important concern in the location of this construction since many children will be impacted by this decision.






New traffic to the riverrenew.com peaked after the City eNews announcement and the Listening Sessions






Tunnel naming has been extended to December 1, 2018

Name

RiverRenew Stakeholder Advisory Group

Size

14-person group representing both ratepayers and construction neighbors, including residents and businesses.

Timeframe

Term. Early 2019 - Mid 2020

Meetings. Monthly or as needed

Next Term. Update/Validate group members and charge of group in Mid 2020

Selection

Identification. Nominations, applications (available at Listening Sessions), discussions at Listening Sessions, through social media, online via website and association meetings

Selection. Once a pool of applicants has been identified, AlexRenew General Manager and City of Alexandria City Manager or his designee select members

Working Group Make Up. Balanced and diverse group of citizens representing neighborhoods, businesses and environmental groups who commit to being active and engaged in the stakeholder process

Charge

Review and monitor program progress

Communicate progress to community by leveraging network to serve as spokespeople for program

Receive input from the public

Provide recommendations regarding mitigation of community impacts



RiverRenew Stakeholder Advisory Group outcomes

- Maintain an active and informed citizen group that provides diverse perspectives throughout design
- Disseminate information to additional networks on program progress through the active citizen group members
- Create a transparent program development process where community perspectives are represented and respected
- Establish trust between AlexRenew and the community


